

St Matthew, Apostle & Evangelist 21st September

On Monday of this week, we celebrate the feast of St Matthew who was born in Capernaum and was the son of Alpheus. According to scripture, Matthew was working as a tax collector, a despised profession during the time of Christ, when Jesus came to him and asked, "Follow me". With this simple call, Matthew became a disciple of Christ. From Matthew we know of the many doings of Christ and the message Christ spread of salvation for all people who come to God through Him. The Gospel account of Matthew tells the same story as that found in the other three Gospels, so scholars are certain of its authenticity.

Our Lady of Walsingham 24th September

This is the only feast of Our Lady proper to England and was originally known as Our Lady of Ransom. The feast reminds us that we are the Dowry of Mary. Originating in Spain for ransoming Christians enslaved by the Moors, devotion to Our Lady of Ransom came to express the desire of Catholics to restore her dowry to Mary. Pope Leo XIII personally encouraged the devotion by making this feast proper to all dioceses of England and by becoming the first President of the Guild of Our Lady of Ransom, founded to foster the reconversion of our country

Reverend Deacon Daniel Rooke

Please keep Deacon Daniel Rooke in your prayers during this coming week. Daniel is preparing for his ordination to the Sacred Priesthood on **Saturday 26th September**. Let us pray also for his family, friends and those who have in any way prepared him for this great day.

Will there be another lockdown? Are we in the beginnings of a second wave of the virus? Will we be restricted further again? What is happening? Will we fall ill or live or die?

These are real questions many of us might have asked ourselves – or avoided because of the anxiety they can generate. But we are in this confusing, developing situation and we are powerless – or at least we are powerless over the big picture. No-one likes to be or to feel powerless. However, we have to recognise that there are times when we are. The coronavirus has shattered the illusion that as human beings we can control everything – even with all our ingenuity and technology, there is so much that is beyond our power to change or manipulate. Of course, there are small things we can do in this situation – maintaining good hygiene, taking care with social distancing and so forth – and these can help. But there is more going on that is beyond us. All we can do is to do our bit.

In the second reading today, St Paul is writing from prison. He is unsure about what is going to happen next. Will he have to die or will he continue to live? Part of him wants to die – he really wants to "be gone and be with Christ." But he has a deep sense of his personal calling. He knows that the Lord might want him to stay alive and to continue to be of service to the Church. In the midst of all this, one thought gives him consolation: "Life to me, of course, is Christ," he says. This is a key part of our Faith: we are not living our lives on our own; Christ is alive with us and within us – and we are with Him and within Him.

In his Letter to the Galatians, Paul makes a similar point: "It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me; and the life that I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and sacrificed Himself for me" (Gal 2:19-20). In this statement Paul is saying a number of things which can help us as we enter new times of uncertainty:

It is no longer I who live – our faith in God liberates us from thinking that my life is just about me. I am not the centre of my life. When I think and behave as if I am, I create more havoc in my life and in those of others because I am trying be God – and I am so not God! Jesus is Lord – and He not only frees us from self-centredness but reveals to us that we are wanted and loved by Him. He so loves us that He wants to free us from the emptiness of self-centredness and instead enter the centre of His life – His relationship with God the Father. Only in embracing this will we find our true self, our true life – "hidden with Christ in God," as Paul says in his Letter to the Colossians (3:3).

It is Christ who lives in me – our Baptism means that we are joined to Christ by the gift of the Holy Spirit. "I am the Vine, you are the branches," says Jesus to us at the Last Supper. It can sometimes be hard to imagine how close Christ is to us. St Augustine says that God is closer to us than we are to ourselves – that's quite a thought! What this means is that we may sometimes feel lonely but we are never alone – Christ is living in us. We need to keep reminding ourselves of this and make acts of faith in Jesus who is really with us. We can say simple prayers like, "Jesus, I believe you are with me. I give you my heart and my soul and my entire life. Help me when I am feeling afraid or lonely to know that you are looking after me." Or we can use a verse from the Psalms, which Jesus prayed on the Cross, "Into your hands, O Lord, I commend my spirit."

The life that I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God – again, our lives don't just belong to ourselves, or to anyone else or to anything else. We do not have to be slaves to anything – not even to fear or to sin or to the world with its changing fashions and its manipulative media. There are plenty of forces in the world and in society that want to control us and manipulate us. As Christians, our faith in Jesus, the Son of God, tells us that there is a Truth which stands above all these competing forces and which enlightens us, showing us how we can be truly be ourselves and truly be free. We can stand back and observe these forces and not just be caught up by the stream of their output. Jesus is the Way, the Truth and the Life – everything else is to be seen in this Light. This means making acts of faith in Jesus every day, praying to Him and through Him to our heavenly Father every day, asking for guidance and enlightenment from the Holy Spirit every day.

Christ loved me and sacrificed Himself for me – yes, He loved us/me so much that He died for us/me. He did this so that we could reach the goal for which we were made – the glory of God and the salvation of our souls. This is the direction of our lives. Whatever we do, we have to choose to do it in the light of that goal. If anything leads us closer to the glory of God and our salvation, it is something for us to choose; if it leads away from that, it is something to avoid. None of us is perfect and we make mistakes, we fall and we sin. But Jesus who died and rose again – the Son of God – He is always waiting to raise us up again so that we can continue walking with Him, and with Him in us and we in Him.
