



THE 'O ANTIPHONS' refer to the seven antiphons that are recited or chanted preceding the Magnificat during Vespers of the Liturgy of the Hours. They cover the special period of Advent preparation known as the 'Octave before Christmas' – 17<sup>th</sup> – 23<sup>rd</sup> December.

The importance of the 'O Antiphons' is twofold: Each one highlights a title for the Messiah: O Sapientia (O Wisdom); O Adonai (O Lord); O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse); O Clavis David (O Key of David); O Oriens (O Rising Sun); O Rex Gentium (O King of Nations); and O Emmanuel (O God with Us) – each one refers to the prophecy of Isaiah of the coming of the Messiah. # ST LOCY, Virgin & Martyr

St Lucy suffered martyrdom at Syracuse (Sicily) probably during the persecution of Diocletian. Devotion spread almost throughout the whole Church and dates back to the earliest times. Her name was inserted into the Roman Canon. Due in part to the manner of her death, St Lucy is a Patron Saint of the Blind.



# 30HN OF THE CROSS - Priest & Doctor

Born at Fontiveros in Old Castile, Spain about the year 1542. He was a Carmelite friar and about the year 1568 he was persuaded by St Teresa of Avila to be the first to undertake the reform of his Order, which cost him much hard work and many trials. He died at Ubeda in Andalusia in 1591. He was outstanding in holiness and knowledge as his many spiritual writings testify:

'Never give up prayer, and should you find dryness and difficulty, persevere in it for this very reason. God often desires to see what love your soul has and

love is not tried by ease and satisfaction' - St John of the Cross

# From Fr David's desk....

Advent is a beautiful season in the Church's life. But you may not notice that it has two part to it. The first part runs up to and includes 16<sup>th</sup> December – these are the ordinary days of Advent. But from 17<sup>th</sup> December there is an Octave of days which leads right up to Christmas Eve. Advent changes gear and this is shown in a number of ways.

First of all, the Gospel readings at Mass: in the first period they are taken from various places in the Gospel, dealing first with the future Second Coming of Christ and then various ways in which we approach Christ, and finally in the middle of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Week of Advent they change gear again and all mention John the Baptist in one way or another. Then, from 17<sup>th</sup> December, the Gospel readings are taken from the Infancy Narratives of either Matthew's or Luke's Gospel, going up to the point before Jesus in born in Bethlehem. So, 17<sup>th</sup> December marks a change in gear: we increase the sense of expectation for celebrating the Lord's Nativity: our salvation is at hand – and when we say that we mean Jesus is at hand, because the names Jesus means God saves.

Secondly, from 17<sup>th</sup> December we begin the Great O Antiphons. These are recited before and after the *Magnificat* at Evening Prayer (Vespers) every day from 17<sup>th</sup> December. They are also used for the *Alleluia* verse before the Gospel at every Mass during the Octave. They take there name from the fact that each one begins with the exclamation *O!* There follows a title inspired by the Old Testament which is applied to Christ. There is a different one each day and they each help us understand the many sides of the salvation which Jesus is. We call on Jesus under these different titles to come and save us in all the many ways we need to be saved. They are as follows:

17<sup>th</sup> December: O Sapientia: O Wisdom, O holy Word of God, you govern all creation with your strong yet tender care. Come and show your people the way to salvation.

18<sup>th</sup> December: O Adonai: O sacred Lord of ancient Israel, who showed yourself to Moses in the burning bush, who gave him the holy law on Sinai mountain: come, stretch out your mighty hand to set us free.

19<sup>th</sup> December: O Radix Jesse: O Flower of Jesse's stem, you have been raised up as a sign for all peoples; kings stand silent in your presence; the nations bow down in worship before you. Come, let nothing keep you from coming to our aid.

20<sup>th</sup> December: O Clavis David: O Key of David, O royal Power of Israel controlling at your will the gate of Heaven: Come, break down the prison walls of death for those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death; and lead your captive people into freedom.

21<sup>st</sup> December: O Oriens: O Radiant Dawn, splendour of eternal light, sun of justice: come, shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death.

22<sup>nd</sup> December: O Rex Gentium: O King of all the nations, the only joy of every human heart; O Keystone of the mighty arch of man, come and save the creature you fashioned from the dust.

23<sup>rd</sup> December: O Emmanuel: O Emmanuel, king and lawgiver, desire of the nations, Saviour of all people, come and set us free, Lord our God.

The hymn O Come, O Come, Emmanuel is based on these antiphons and is properly sung during this period.

May Our Lady, Help of Christians, Our Lady Immaculate, St Joseph, St Lawrence, St Edmund, St Rita, St Lucy, St John of the Cross pray for us all.
