SOMETHING WORTH DYING FOR – ST VALENTINES DAY - On February 14 every year, couples around the world celebrate one of the heroes of Catholic history. As the story goes, Valentine was a Roman priest who married young couples in secret despite the decree of Emperor Claudius II forbidding all weddings. The emperor did this to more readily recruit young, unattached men into his armies. Valentine was discovered, arrested and eventually executed. St Valentine didn't officiate secret weddings simply out of compassion for local, lovestruck couples. He did it because Catholic marriage is about a whole lot more than just two people committing to live together and maybe raise a few children.

Catholic marriage has a purpose beyond the fulfilment of the two spouses. It is a call to honour God by living in service to each other, helping each other and their children to grow closer to God and to our

Ss Cyril and Methodius

Cyril was born in Salonika and was educated at Constantinople. With his brother Methodius he went to Moravia to preach the faith. They both translated the liturgical books into the Slavonic language using the Cyrillic alphabet which they invented. They were called to Rome and here Cyril died on 14th February in the year 869. Methodius was made a bishop and went to Pannonia (Hungary) where he laboured ceaselessly in preaching the gospel, while enduring many hardships as a result of jealously, though he had the support of the Holy See. He died on 6th April in the year 885 at Velehrad in Czechoslovakia.



The Seven Holy Founders of the Servite Order

These seven men were born in Florence and led lives as hermits on Monte Senario, especially venerating the Blessed Virgin Mary. They then preached through the length and breadth of Tuscany, and founded the Order of Servites which in 1304 received the approval of the Holy See. They are venerated on this day which s said to be the day which St Alexis Falconieri, one of the seven, died in the year 1310

From Fr David's desk.....

We really do seem to be emerging from the pandemic. Of course, we are eyeing things carefully, perhaps even cautiously. But things seem to be moving in the right direction.

But which direction is the right direction? St Paul, in the second reading today, makes plain that our hope in Christ looks forward to beyond this life. There is a danger that we only think about this life, a danger that the lockdowns perhaps have accentuated. The fear and anxiety that were generated, even in a manipulative manner, has had an impact on all generations and it is important to reflect on how it has affected each one of us. Did we lose sight of our faith in God, our hope in His care for us, on the need to love God above all things and to love each other as Christ has loved us? Does our Faith shape and inspire our lives? What do we search for most of all in our lives? God? If not, why not?

These are not easy questions; but they also should not be asked in a harsh, judgmental way. It is too easy to think about God as if He is saddled with the critical, judgmental thought patterns that so often form our thinking. "My thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are my ways your ways," says the Lord in Isaiah 55:8. The questions need to be asked in the light of the truth our Faith that "God is love" (1John 4:16). God the Father is the eternal Lover; God the Son is the eternally Beloved; and God the Holy Spirit is the eternal Love of Father and Son.

The questions above really gravitate around the question, Do I believe that God really is love, that He really loves me, and He wants me to be for ever united to Him in the infinitely joyous loving which He is? Those are big and deep questions, but we need to ask them. In Jesus we find how far God is prepared to go to win our hearts, to gain our love. He died on the Cross, accepting all that human sinfulness and brokenness could throw at Him, and loving us all the time throughout. He rose from the dead to show us that there is nothing, absolutely nothing, that can extinguish His eternal love – not even death. In fact, death and sin are being swallowed up by His never-ending love: His rising from the death is the foundation of all our hope that, when we die, we will be with Him.

If we did lose sight of God, we do not need to be afraid: God never lost sight of us. If we made mistakes, God is reaching out to make them right. We do not need to judge ourselves so harshly when God loves us so completely. Whatever happened, it is time to turn back to Him. We need to live in the light of our Faith. We need to live by grace and not just by human fear. We can let God take away our fear and heal us of all those things which hold us back – including our false ideas of God.

Look at Jesus: everywhere He went, He healed. He freed people from all that ailed them. He still heals us. The sacraments are the chief instruments He uses to heal us. Not only do they heal us but they also fill us with grace – grace which is the sunshine of the soul – God pouring into us the full vigour of His life and light and peace. When we live in a state of grace, we are living in communion with God – or rather, God is truly alive in each of us. So – come to the sacraments. Receive Baptism or Confirmation or Holy Communion; come back to the sacrament of Confession and Reconciliation to experience the liberating joy of a new beginning; receive the Anointing of the Sick if you are unwell, mentally or physically. Don't hold back – because in each of these sacraments we experience the amazing grace of our God who never holds back.
