
#### Church Cleaning


### St |gnatius Loyola, Priest The memoria of St Ignatius of Loyola is not observed this year as it falls on a Sunday

Born in the year 1491 at Loyola in northern Spain, his early life was led at court and in the army. He was later converted to a life of holiness. He studied theology at Paris and gathered companions around him and afterwards at Rome he formed the Society of Jesus (Jesuits). He exercised a very fruitful apostolate by his written work and by the formation of his disciples who were outstanding in the reform of the Church. He died at Rome in the year 1556. ## St Alphonsus Liguori – Bishop & Doctor

Born in Naples in the year 1696. He studied law and took his doctor's degree in both civil and canon law, became a priest and later founded the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer (Redemptorists). In order to promote among the faithful a truly Christian life he spent his time in preaching and in writing, especially about moral theology of which discipline he is looked upon as the master. He was chosen to be Bishop of Sant' Agata dei Goti, but soon gave up the post and returned to his own Congregation where he died at Nocera dei Pagani in Campagna in the year 1787



## St John Mary Vianney - Priest

Born at Lyons in the year 1786. After overcoming tremendous difficulties, he was finally ordained priest. He was given charge of the parish of Ars in the diocese of Belley, and by his forthright preaching, personal mortification, prayer and charity renewed it and increased it in a wonderful way. His help to those who came to the sacrament of confession was renowned and people flocked to him from all sides to obtain his advice. He died in the year 1859. In his catechetical instructions, St John Mary Vianney writes, 'We had deserved to be left incapable of praying; but God in His goodness has permitted us to speak to Him. Our prayer is an incense that is delightful to God.' St John Mary Vianney is the Patron Saint of Parish Priests



# Transfiguration of the Lord

In the midst of the disciples' fears, Christ reveals Himself to them in a tiny glimpse of what the resurrection will be like. This brief vision of Christ, in His glory, was given to Peter, James and John, in order to strengthen the trails of their faith which the sufferings and crucifixion of their beloved master would bring on them. All of us, I'm sure, long to have a glimpse of Christ in our everyday lives – maybe to reassure us of God's presence, maybe to remind us of what awaits us in heaven or perhaps to strengthen our weak faith.

What do we know of the glory of God when we have never seen him with our own eyes or heard His voice with our ears?

The reality is, of course, that there are real glimpses of God all around us each and every day of our lives – all that we need to do is look for them and recognise them for what they really are. We can see Christ in the hungry, the poor, the homeless, the disadvantaged – we can see Him in those whom we love, our families, our friends – we can see Him in the beauty of the world around us, in the sunset or sunrise, in the trees and rivers, the flowers and plants, in our homes and of course here in our church – in the sacraments, in our devotions, in the Mass – all of these are full of the richness and beauty of Christ.

There are two potentialities within each of us – the potential for good and the potential for evil. We are capable of hatred, bitterness, greed, envy and the like. These are ugly things and bring out the worst in us – they corrupt our hearts and minds and draw us away from God. Whereas our potential for good makes us capable of love, joy, patience, kindness, compassion – these are beautiful things and bring out the best in us. They purify our hearts and minds and draw us ever closer to God. Goodness transfigures us.

Mount Tabor and Calvary are linked in the Gospel and are linked also in life. We long for the experience of transfiguration, to stand alongside Peter, James and John to see God revealed in Jesus Christ. We want to be like Moses and catch a glimpse of His glory. We want to be like Elijah, to hear God in the sound of stillness. But the magnificence of Christ transfigured on Mount Tabor is to be found veiled in the garden at Gethsemane and on Calvary. The glory of God, not now seen directly by our eyes, is just as real and present when Christ experiences His agony in the garden – for in this agony of Christ all mankind was involved. The passion of Jesus Christ is for all time and all people. Tabor and Calvary, in their different ways, reveal the true face of Christ who is the Son of God for, as we know, there was to be a further revelation when the crucified Christ became the risen Christ.

The vision of God transfigured in His Son, Jesus Christ, gave His disciples the hope to carry them through the journey of Christ's passion – we too are given this same hope today to carry us through the events of Christ's passion - remembering that Christ died for all mankind.

In His love for us, God allows us to taste on earth the joys of the world to come. In between, however, we must travel in the darkness of faith.
