Gospel Reflection - In our Gospel today we hear the familiar story of how Jesus gives sight to the blind man. Unless you happen to be blind, we might think that this Gospel story has no relevance for us. It is precisely because we can see that it has relevance for us – the question is how well do we see.

For us to see well good eyesight alone is not sufficient – we must not think that blindness affects only the eyes. There are many forms of blindness besides physical blindness; in many ways these are just as crippling: SELFISHNESS blinds us to the needs of others – INSENSITIVITY blinds us to the hurt we cause to others; SNOBBERY blinds us to the equal dignity of others; PRIDE can blind us to the truth; THE PACE of our lives can blind us to the beauty of the earth around us; MATERIALISM blinds us to spiritual values. It is not only with our eyes that we see – we also 'see' with our minds.

Just a few weeks ago we heard the Gospel story of The Transfiguration when Jesus took Peter, James, and John to the top of Mount Tabor and there saw a brief glimpse of God and Peter telling Jesus "Lord, it is wonderful for us to be here." Peter knew what it was that he had seen and recognised that it was God. Compare this with our own lives – how often do we get a 'glimpse of God'? How often do we recognise what it is we are seeing or do we simply turn our backs on God.

We are constantly being reminded that we were born sinners and indeed will remain sinners all our life – this can often affect the way we live our lives – we can become despondent and disillusioned. We are not sinners trying to become holy – it is not that way round – we were created holy but have become sinners – there remains holiness within us. Our task in life is to ensure that our holiness becomes ever greater each day and we can achieve this by 'opening our eyes' – by seeing God as He really is – by being drawn ever closer to him.

The Church teaches us to spend some time at the end of each day reflecting on the sins we have committed that day but we must also reflect on the many graces that we have received during each day - those glimpses of God – it is only when we do this that we see the hope of our salvation. But what of those times when we see God but fail to recognise Him? Those times when we go our own way thinking that we know best. Those times when we find it too easy to give up. How do we deal with those who are unjust with us? Are we always prepared to shoulder a particular heavy weight or burden of our own or someone else's?

A Mother Superior once said to a member of her community who was grumbling about the cross that she had to carry – "Don't drag your cross – carry it."

Our heavenly Father knows each one of us inside and out – He knows the difficulties that face us each day – He knows that we will stop loving Him again and again but that He will never stop loving us – it is for this reason that He has given us the Sacrament of Confession for us to use time and time again – to restore our holiness our closeness to Him.

Lent is a special time of grace and preparation – preparation for the great joy of Easter when we celebrate the risen Christ – our Saviour. Have no fear of Confession – there is no sin; no sin whatsoever that cannot be laid before God seeking His forgiveness – come to Confession and restore your vision in God.

Ponder the closing paragraph in today's Gospel – Jesus' words to the Pharisees are chilling: They claim not to be blind but Jesus simply says to them, "Blind? If you were, you would not be guilty, but since you say, 'We see,' your guilt remains."

May Our Lady Help of Christians, Our Lady of Peace, St Lawrence, St Joseph, St Rita, St John Henry Newman, St Thurribius pray for us all.
