

Queen Elizabeth II 1926 – 2022

Almighty God, You are the author and sustainer of all human life;

St John Chrysostom – was born at Antioch about the year 349. After a brilliant course of studies, he began to lead a life of austerity. He was ordained priest and laboured in preaching, with great fruit. In 397 he became Bishop of Constantinople and showed himself a true pastor, striving to reform the morals of both clergy and people. He incurred the hatred of the imperial court and his work was undermined because of jealousy, and twice he was sent into exile. Overcome by exhaustion he died at Comana in Pontus on 14th September 407. Because of his sermons and writings to explain the faith and to encourage the practice of the Christian life he was called 'John of the Golden Mouth'



Ss Cornelius & Cyprian - Cornelius was ordained Bishop of Rome in the year 251. He laboured to combat the Novatian schism and with the help of Cyprian he was able to enforce his authority. He was sent into exile by the Emperor Gallus, and he died at Civitavecchia (Rome) in the year 253. His body was brought to Rome and interred in the cemetery of Callistus. Cyprian was born at Carthage about the year 210. He was converted to the

faith in mature life and ordained priest. He was ordained Bishop of Carthage in 249. He guided his church excellently during much troubled times both by his deeds and his writings. During the persecution of Valerian, he was first exiled, then, on 14th September 258, martyred for the faith.

Reflection on the Exaltation of the Holy Cross



The one symbol most often identified with Jesus and his Church is the Cross. On Thursday we celebrate the feast of The Exaltation of the Holy Cross. This feast traces its beginning to Jerusalem and the dedication of the church built on the site of Mount Calvary in 335. But the meaning of the Cross is deeper than any city, any celebration, any building. The Cross is a sign of suffering, a sign of human cruelty at its worst. But by Christ's love shown in the Paschal Mystery, it has become the sign of triumph and victory, the sign of God, who is love itself. Believers have always looked to the Cross in times of suffering. People in concentration camps, in prisons, in hospitals, in any place of suffering and loneliness, have been known to draw, trace,

or form crosses and focus their eyes and hearts on them. The cross does not explain pain and misery; it does not give us any easy answers; but it does help us to see our lives united with Christ's. We often make the Sign of the Cross over ourselves; we make it before prayer to help fix our minds and hearts on God; we make it after prayer, hoping to stay close to God. In trials and temptations, the Cross is a sign of strength and protection, it is the sign of the fullness of life that is ours. At Baptism, too, the Sign of the Cross is used; the priest/deacon, parents, and godparents make the sign on the forehead of the child - 'claiming the child for Christ.'
