He was born in Elstow, Bedford, in 1628, served for three years in the army in Newport Pagnell, spent twelve years in Bedford County Gaol while imprisoned for his preaching, and published his most famous work, *The Pilgrim's Progress*, in 1678. It is not complimentary about Catholicism but, in the run-up to the 400th anniversary of his birth, what do we have in common with, and what can we learn from, this Great Dissenter, Non-Conformist and Puritan preacher?

Return to Our Lady

The world grapples with a great disease. A war rages in Europe. A new invasion of Palestine threatens to unsettle the Middle East. Theological confusion darkens the hearts of the faithful. A bishop writes: *“Unless the hand of God intervenes directly... all will be lost.”* The year is 1531: God does intervene. Almost 500 hundred years ago the world faced many of the same problems as it does today. Back then, through the intercession of Our Lady of Guadalupe, God intervened.

Cardinal Raymond Burke from America is embarking on a nine-month novena to the Virgin Mary to intercede *“against the pressing crisis of our age”* – and he is calling on Catholics around the world to join him. Third Sunday of Lent – Gospel Reflection St John 2:13-25

According to St John, this scene took place at the beginning of Jesus’ ministry, on the first of Jesus’ four visits to Jerusalem.

At each subsequent visit the Temple authorities lay in wait for Jesus, increasingly keen to eliminate him, but unable to do so till his Hour had come. The other gospels place both this incident and all other scenes of Jesus in Jerusalem as the final climax of Jesus’ ministry. Whichever is correct, the incident is the basic cause of Jesus’ arrest and his tortured death.

By his action Jesus had demonstrated that the worship carried out in the Temple had become vain in God’s eyes owing to its lack of integrity and must be superseded. To the Temple authorities this was intolerable, and he must be removed. Again, Jesus demanded a complete reversal of standards.

His puzzling saying about building the Temple anew in his body was at last understood by his disciples after his resurrection when they realised it meant the Temple that was his Body, the Church. The material building which had been the centre of worship was no longer important.

Henceforth all worship would take place in any place, but within the Christian community. The community - or the Church - was now the place of sanctification and of prayer to God.
