The Exhalation of the Holy Cross - Scripture Reflection

From Fr Daniel's desk...Change is a funny thing, isn't it? It can feel a bit like standing in a doorway, with one foot still in the familiar room behind you, and the other stepping into a new space. There is a mix of feelings there: the love for what has been, and the hope for what is to come, with perhaps a little measure of trepidation. I am feeling this myself as I begin this journey with you all, wondering about whom I will meet, worrying about how to serve you as a pastor, and I imagine many of you feel this way too as we start this new chapter together.

It is fitting, then, that this week we celebrate the "Exultation of the Cross", and like many other feast days of the Lord, it is paired with a devotion to Our Lady. Monday will be the memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows. The Church chooses to link these two devotions inviting us to see their deep, inseparable connection. Two feasts presenting two sides of perspectives of one mystery.

We see this duality in the scripture readings. The First Reading from Numbers presents a curious and, at first, unsettling scene. The Israelites, weary and impatient in the wilderness, complain against God and Moses. They are then afflicted with venomous snakes, a consequence of their faithlessness. The remedy from God is perhaps shocking, and yet becomes a symbol of victory. Moses is commanded to fashion a bronze serpent and raise it on a pole. Those who look upon it live. The torturous snakes are defeated by God. So that even if bitten God will save them.

In John's Gospel, Jesus directly links Himself to this serpent. "As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up." We look upon an instrument of torture and proclaim it as our glory. This time it is death itself that has been defeated, and God will save us. The Cross, then, is a sign that God does not simply eliminate suffering, magic away our real troubles, but He enters it, defeats it, and lifts it up, Changing it. We might recall Holy Communion when again, with the Host and Chalice lifted High, they are changed to the Body and Blood of Christ.

The Cross is the triumph of Christ's obedience and love. Who knows this dual reality better than Our Lady? Exaltation, even the celebration of the God act of salvation does not mean we escape reality. It remains right and healthy to face the sorrows of looking upon the cross, and embrace them. In the Holy Land beside the site of the Crucifixion, inside the Holy Sepulchre is a statue of Mary with seven large swords piercing her heart, weeping; sorrow does not need to stop us, instead our emotions are a means for prayer and growth.

This feast reminds us that the triumph of the Cross was not a sterile event of history. It was a first a victory born of love and also endured with immense human sorrow. Our Lady's tears do not diminish the glory of the Cross; instead, they are proof of the love that made the sacrifice possible. The two feasts together offer us a complete picture of our faith. To be a people of the Cross is to understand that true love is never without cost. As we navigate our own time of change together, let us hold these two truths in our hearts. There is room for mixed emotions, yet like our lady we can forge forward with grace and purpose. Like St Andrew Kim Taegon and his companions, hold fast to our faith even in times of uncertainty. And, like St Hildegard of Bingen, find new ways to express the ancient truths of our faith.
